Fruit chaat is a delicious and refreshing dish that can be easily prepared for four servings. Here's a simple recipe.

The needed ingredients are : 2 diced apples, 2 sliced bananas, 1 cup halved grapes, 1 cup pomegranate seeds, 1 cup chopped pineapple, 1 cup chopped papaya, 1 diced cucumber, Chaat masala to taste, black salt to taste, roasted cumin powder to taste, lemon juice from 1 lemon

Method of Preparation: Wash and peel the fruits as needed. Dice apples, slice bananas, halve grapes, deseed pomegranate, chop pineapple and papaya, and dice cucumber. In a large mixing bowl, combine all the diced and sliced fruits. Gently toss the fruits and vegetables together to ensure an even distribution of spices. Squeeze one lemon juice from over the fruit mixture. Refrigerate the fruit chaat for at least 30 minutes before serving to allow the flavours to meld.
